Minister for Education and MP Visit College to Announce \$40 Million Upgrade

In Week 3 of Term 4, we were excited to welcome two very special guests to the College: Minister for Education, Dr Tony Buti and Member of Parliament Margaret Quirk MLA. Our Year 7 Student Leaders, Kriya and Ryan, had the honour of greeting them with a warm welcome. After arriving, Dr Buti and Ms Quirk completed a tour of the College and chatted with staff and students.

The purpose of the visit was to announce their continued commitment to the \$40 million upgrade of the College, which will commence in 2025. The upgrades will bring state-of-the-art facilities to our College, and construction is set to begin in March of next year. The build will include a new Design and Technology building, ready by mid-2026, and a brand-new two-storey building to be finished by late 2026.

We're extremely grateful to Minister Buti and Ms Quirk for their continued support of the College. This investment will help provide our students with fantastic new spaces in which to learn and succeed for many years to come.

Duke of Edinburgh - Adventurous Journey

On Wednesday, 6 November, the Student Leader and Lead Captain team members embarked on their three-day Adventurous Journey to Moora as part of their Bronze Level of the Duke of Edinburgh International Award. The team was tasked with planning the food and shelter for the trip, not just for ourselves but also for our teachers.



In the week prior, we completed our Practice Journey. We completed activities such as bushwalking, practising administering first aid and setting up tents. Although it was a struggle at times, we had plenty of laughs throughout the process.

Once arriving in Moora, our first stop was the bakery, which turned out to be one of our favourites. Next, we headed to Central Midlands Senior High School (CMSHS). At CMSHS, we met with the Student Leaders from their school and discussed the positives and challenges of attending a country school. Then Mrs Lewis, from the Moora Historical Society, took us on a tour and shared some of the history of Moora, which was interesting, though it felt like forever walking up and down the street. On Day 2, we met a local Indigenous elder named Uncle Fred. Fred shared with us what life was like for Indigenous people in Moora during the 1950s. He took us on a tour of the area where he grew up and showed us a project he created in partnership with the Moora Catchment Council. The area showcased the story of the Yued people, with paintings made by Fred's wife.

Around 2 pm, we set off to visit Mrs Keefe's farm. Mrs Keefe, a Home Economics teacher at CMSHS, and her family are primarily wheat and sheep farmers. They were in the process of harvesting their wheat. Mrs Keefe's son, Tim, took time out of his busy day to show us a combine harvester (or "header"), one of the largest machines we had ever seen. We each took turns riding along in the driver's cab while the harvest was completed. It was amazing to see the technology involved—almost like playing on a PlayStation 5! This was definitely one of the best parts of our trip, and we didn't want to leave, but we had more to do that day.

Later that night, we walked across town to Moora Residential College, attached to CMSHS. Students who live too far away attend the "Resi College," as it's known, giving them the opportunity for face-to-face education while being cared for outside of school hours by the wonderful staff. On the oval, a telescope was set up by Moora local Donna from Startrack Astro Events. We each took a turn looking through the telescope to see one of the clearest images of the moon we'd ever seen. Unfortunately, the weather was overcast that night, so we couldn't see any stars, but we toured the residential college. We were amazed by the facilities,



including ping pong tables, a 50-inch TV, basketball courts, and a pool. We finished the night by listening to Donna give a presentation on space. Our second day was long but very fun and informative.

Whole School and Cluster STEM

STEM is an integral part of ensuring our students achieve a positive future. Ashdale Secondary College and the Ashdale Cluster have placed STEM as a priority providing the essential future-ready skills of critical thinking, problem-solving, creativity, innovation, communication and collaboration across all learning areas. The College offers a wide variety of STEM subject choices and activities for all students to engage and learn. It has been a massive year for all involved with even more exciting STEM activities planned for 2025.

Crazy Good Tech Challenge

During Term 3, Years 7-10 students from our Approved Specialist Classes participated in a one-day accelerated design sprint, creating innovative solutions for living well with technology. The Crazy Good Tech Challenge (CGTC), a collaboration between IBM and Crazy Ideas College (CIC), provided a platform for our students to voice their ideas on tech topics that truly matter.

Our students, along with over 1,000 students across Australia, participated in this design sprint to generate bold and inspired ideas.

During the CIC-facilitated workshop, students worked in small teams to tackle four key questions:

- 1. How do we use tech to boost learning and skills?
- 2. How do we help people stay safe online?
- 3. How do we help people build healthy habits for using phones and other technology?
- 4. How might we show up as the best version of ourselves online?

Guided through exploration, idea generation, prototyping, testing, and promoting their concepts, our students showcased their creativity and ingenuity. A distinguished panel of judges will select four winning ideas, including Kate Kirwin from She Codes, Rosie Thomas OAM from Project Rocket, Janet Searle from CSIRO, and Jade Moffat from IBM.

Kieran Murrihy, Founding Director at CIC, highlighted the importance of the Challenge: "We all benefit when we unlock the ingenuity, resourcefulness, and optimism of young people. We harness their wisdom and creativity to solve complex tech challenges by engaging them in conversations about technology. The CGTC will generate solutions to help us all live with and use tech well."

We are proud of our students' participation and look forward to seeing the innovative ideas they've developed posted on CICBeyond. com. Schools across QLD, ACT, and VIC also participate in this incredible Challenge, creating a wave of creativity and innovation across Australia.

We flew out on Sunday, 1 December, from Perth Airport and arrived in Canberra, and despite some slight delays, students were excited and ready for their trip. Each day, we visited more than four venues relating to the HaSS disciplines of Economics, Geography, History, Civics and Citizenship, plus some additional locations for fun! Highlights of the tour included; witnessing a High Court case in action (relating directly to the Year 9 curriculum on miscarriages of justice!), debating free university degrees at the Federal Parliament of Australia, hearing moving stories of bravery and mateship at the Australian War Memorial, and having the incredible opportunity to play the \$250,000 grand piano at Government House. We also deepened our learning of politics by visiting the Museum of Democracy, where we roleplayed the pivotal damming of the Franklin River debate and simulated a national election at the Parliamentary Education Office.

Other notable stops included Questacon, where we explored scientific principles through play and the Australian Institute of Sport (AIS), where we observed some of Australia's top athletes train. We played glowin-the-dark mini golf, and students competed in multiple games of beach volleyball at the accommodation! We finished the tour with a bang in Sydney. We arrived at



the scenic Taronga Zoo via ferry. We had a fantastic afternoon with the animals before sightseeing at important landmarks such as the Sydney Opera House and the Harbour Bridge. This tour would not have been possible without the funding provided by the government through the Parliament and Civics Education Rebate (PACER), which made it affordable for a school from WA to travel to the east coast. By providing \$510 per student who travelled, the PACER rebate assisted families in facilitating this fantastic experience. Thank you to the parents and community who funded the rest and lent us their children for the week! Even more so, it would not have been possible without the outstanding educators who volunteered to be away from their families and give up their time to be on duty 24/7 for six days. Thank you to Mrs Doyle and Mr Crabb for all of their help and expertise throughout the trip.

We are incredibly proud of the students who participated in the 2024 HaSS Canberra Tour. They embodied the schools' values of respect, independence, and cooperation in the way they interacted with each other, the educational staff, and the public. 2024: A Landmark Year for the Ashdale Robotics Team

The Ashdale Robotics Team has had its most successful year to date in 2024, marking a significant milestone as the team competed for the first time as an official FIRST Robotics Team. The team's journey began in early January, during the school holidays, with students diving into the design, prototyping, and building of their robot, Lil' Timmy, for the 2024 competition game Crescendo.

Determined to succeed, students dedicated their time throughout the holidays and after school throughout Term 1, preparing for the Southern Cross Regional competition in Sydney. In March, a team of 9 students, alongside 1 former student, travelled to Sydney to compete against 46 teams from around the globe. Their hard work paid off as they secured an impressive 16th place, ranking as the top public school team in the competition.

After returning from Sydney, the team shifted their focus to the WA Robotics Playoffs. With an influx of new members bringing the total team count to 27, Ashdale Robotics expanded for the first time, creating a second team. Students split their time between Lil' Timmy and their new robot, Big Billy, working during after-school sessions, the July school holidays, and Curtin preparation days.

In August, the teams competed at the WA Robotics Playoffs, with Ashdale placing 3rd and 5th in a highly competitive field. With these achievements under their belt, 2025 promises to be another exciting year for the team. Both teams are already preparing for the WA Robotics Playoffs, and Lil' Timmy's Big Team is gearing up for the next Sydney Robotics Tour in early 2026.






Year 10 Outdoor Recreation Camp: An Unforgettable Experience in Lancelin

ECU UniPrep 2024 - 2025

Ashdale SC runs Edith Cowan University's UniPrep for Schools program as part of the Year 12 subject selection. Students apply to be part of this program, and it is delivered to complement students' general studies timetable. Upon successful completion of this program, in combination with their WACE certificate, students will receive a minimum ECU indicative ATAR score of 70.

Student Support

Prevent Alcohol-Related Trauma in Youth (P.A.R.TY) Excursion

On Friday, 7 June, we attended St John of God Hospital in Midland for the PARTY Program excursion. We toured the Intensive Care Unit and Emergency Ward, led by presenters throughout the day. We were shown the ambulance bays and were given a talk by a paramedic who discussed his work in the field. It was inspiring for students interested in the paramedic field. We were then shown the Emergency Ward, where patients would be taken in from the ambulance and given immediate help. The presenter showed us the different ways to help a patient who has experienced trauma, including intubating through their mouth or trachea or putting in a catheter to assist with a coma. The guide gave a talk regarding life support and organ donation and informed us of the possible choices we may have to make for our families.

Afterwards, we were allowed to try out some of the rehabilitation equipment Physiotherapists use on patients who have experienced trauma and their ability to walk. We used wheelchairs as well as other similar equipment that are used for patients who can stand but can't walk. We were shown sets of bars to assist with walking, where we tried to do triceps dips. Most patients who can't walk without assistance aren't allowed to be discharged from the hospital until they can perform a certain number of dips as they use their arms to assist with movements. It made us understand how hard it could be if you faced a trauma and weren't able to walk.

The day concluded with a presentation from two guest speakers. One man who had suffered strokes due to excessive drug use, and another man who was in a car accident and became paralysed. Both men shared their confronting stories of how their lives were changed due to mistakes they made as teenagers. These men inspired students to stay away from drugs and stay safe on the roads.
