WELCOME

Welcome, and congratulations on choosing to be a part of the Ashdale Secondary College Music Academy.

For many music students in Year 7, this will be their first classroom or instrumental music experience, and all parties understand the commitment and expectations of being part of the ASC Music Academy.

What are the expectations of a music student?

To be a successful music student and to have a successful music department in the school, a high level of commitment and dedication is required by all music students.

Expectations include:

- Class Music twice per week (Music Academy stream)
- Weekly attendance at instrument/vocal lessons
- Weekly attendance at ensemble rehearsal
- Regular practice on your instrument/voice
- Attendance at performances throughout the year
- Self-motivation, independence and creativity
- Minimum two-year commitment to Music Academy (Years 7 and 8)

IMSS Instrumental and vocal Lessons - what to expect

All students enrolled in ASC Music Academy must learn an instrument or voice privately or through the school. Beginners will be allocated an instrument based on personal preference, suitability to the instrument and availability of instruments and positions.

The Music Learning Area at Ashdale SC and Instrumental Music School Services (IMSS) run instrumental and voice lessons together. Each instrumental/voice teacher comes to the College on a designated day to give lessons as a small group or individual, depending on the instrument and year level. Lesson times are usually between 20 - 30 minutes.



For ongoing IMSS instrumental students (i.e., you already have IMSS lessons in primary school), lessons will commence in Week 2 of Term 1.

For beginning IMSS students (starting lessons through IMSS on a new instrument), lessons will commence in Week 3 of Term 1. IMSS lessons are run during school hours and are cycled on a rotating timetable. This means that during the period the IMSS teacher is in the school, the student's lessons will rotate times each week. This is done so that students will not miss the same subject class each week. Sometimes, a fixed timetable may be used if the teacher deems it more beneficial or necessary. Senior School students are given priority times outside of scheduled class times, such as before school, recess and lunch, to minimise the impact on their Senior School

courses.

The student is responsible for checking lesson times and ensuring they attend their lesson. Instrumental students will leave class five minutes before their lesson and sign in to "Instrumental Music" at Student Services. After the music lesson, they will sign out of "Instrumental Music" and return to their timetabled class. All lessons are in the Music Learning Area.

Timetables are posted in the Music Department foyer to check, and copies are made available for students to take. Your classroom teacher will show students where these are found during Week 1.

The music student is responsible for checking with the subject teacher about any work/homework they may have missed during their lesson time.

Do I need to purchase an instrument?

In most cases, ongoing students will already own their instrument/s. This usually applies to classical guitars, flutes, clarinets and trumpets.

For beginner instrumentalists, you may be entitled to hire your instrument through IMSS. Instruments are usually loaned for one year, which may be extended in some situations. The hire fee per year is \$110.00.

Instruments for hire usually include:

- Trombone/Baritone/Euphonium (two years)
- Saxophone (two years)
- Bassoon (unlimited)

Instruments expected to be purchased include:

- All Guitars (inc. amps where applicable)
- Trumpet (ongoing)
- Flutes (ongoing)
- Clarinets (ongoing)
- Drums/Percussion (mallets, sticks & practice pad)*

*A full drum kit is desirable but not required in the first 1 - 2 years of tuition. It is recommended to purchase after two years if the student is continuing.

In addition, consumables such as reeds, cork grease, guitar strings, picks, drumsticks and any tuition books will need to be purchased as requested by the teacher and as required throughout the year.

What is a Practice Journal?

A practice journal is a book given to the student by the IMSS teacher for communication. This includes teacher-student and teacher-parent.

The teacher will ask students to write in the activities to be practised during the week and any other necessary information, including assessments, requested book purchases, equipment, reeds, etc.

Students are to record their daily practice, and parents are to sign it each week. This is the primary source of communication between all three parties, and the front cover has various information about suggested practice regimes, expectations and contact numbers for IMSS. All parents and students should read this section.



Do I play in an ensemble?

Yes! Every instrumental or vocal student will be required to join an ensemble when the teacher is satisfied the student is ready. For ongoing students, this will usually be immediately; for beginners, this will usually be by the end of Semester 1 or once their progress is sufficient.

Ensemble playing develops a range of qualities, including better musicianship, a sense of belonging, increased self-esteem and leadership. We are very fortunate to have the following ensembles at ASC. Ensemble rehearsals operate out of school hours for 60 minutes.

Classical Guitar Ensemble	Wednesday	7.40 am – 8.40 am
Vocal Ensemble	Wednesday	2.40 pm- 3.40 pm
Contemporary Ensemble	Thursday	7.30 am - 8.30 am

What do I do in classroom music?

Class Music (Music Academy stream) will be timetabled twice weekly for the year as their Arts component. The classroom programs encompass WA Curriculum Arts strands, 'Making' and 'Responding', allowing students to develop skills in music theory, aural training, composition, performance (group and solo), listening activities, music technology and music culture and history.

Music Academy students will also complete and be reported on one project (10 weeks) for Visual Art in both Year 7 and Year 8, as mandated in the WA Curriculum for The Arts.

Opportunities are provided for students to demonstrate creativity, collaboration and individual excellence.

Class Music does not include individual instruction of an instrument as this is the role of IMSS or private tutors.
